## Communal Hut and Composting Toilet

The communal hut is used for meetings, open days where it is turned into a cafe and barbecues at key times of the year. It has solar panelling as has the toilet building to supply hot water when required.



## Recycling, Waste Management and Crop Protection

Allotments by nature encourage the use of recycling anything and everything and you see some interesting reuse of odd items such as the climbing frame below to support netting and broccoli plants and old office drawers have come in useful for storage in this greenhouse.



There are only two bins for all 163 plots and no green waste can be disposed of to encourage composting.
